#### **Community Pride Project**

The Community Pride Project, a community environmental support group was set up in August 2010. Many local groups and community came together to develop this initiative, from the youngest to the oldest which really makes it work.

The project concentrates on maintaining and rejuvenating the environment making the community a better and safer place to live. There are regular clean up events, such as the painting of the walls on the main road, the rejuvenation of the basketball court, clean up event on the spine site, clean up event in Marigold, clean up event in Buttercup, not to mention our environmental workers who are out everyday working in the Community.

With the support of St. Stephen's Green Trust and FÁS we purchased our very own graffiti removal machine (not many communities can boast about this one!) and we are currently working our way around the community removing graffiti from walls and homes.

The main benefits of this project are:

- It provides local employment through the FÁS Community Employment Programme.
- It provides a safer, more pleasant place to live.
- It provides educational supports for children about their environment.
- It provides support to small environmental groups in the community.
- It provides a 'Pride of Place'.

The Community Pride Project team are constantly looking to support residents to set up small environmental groups either by road, cul de sac, or area. The first of these environmental groups will be set up in Tulip Court in January 2012. We will work with the residents here in what ever way we can to improve their part of the community and to support them in their work.

It's all about 'Pride of Place'.

### Bring a Brush Day Tuesday 24th August 2010

On Tuesday 24th August 2010 the Darndale Belcamp Village Centre had a Community Bring a Brush day. #### **Graffiti Removal Project**

The purpose of the graffiti removal project is to support the work of the Community Pride Project, which focuses on the regeneration and improvement of the environment of Darndale and Belcamp. At present there are approximately 2,080 m2 of graffiti on our community's walls and homes. The cost to remove this comercially would be €23,608 the Community Pride Project's cost would be much cheaper than this. Work will commence on the Graffiti Removal Project very soon. The Community Pride Project would like to extend a big thank you to Dublin City Council for providing us with over €3,500 worth of chemicals and helping us to progress further with the Community Pride Project.
